I recently heard a gentleman give a thought on the topic of the environmentalism. Specifically, he asked the question, "What responsibility do Christians have in taking care of the environment?" People have lots of different views on this from, "God created the world for humanity so we can do whatever we want with it," to, "We ought to take upmost care of the world because God has made it," and everything in between.

Genesis 1:28 is often referenced in this type of conversation which says, "God blessed them and said to them, 'Be fruitful and increase in number, fill the earth and subdue it." The Hebrew word that is there translated "subdue" has a wide range of meanings. It can mean anything from subdue or tame to enslave or assault. A good way of looking at it might be to, "harness its potential." Personally, I think because God created the world and called it good, we ought to conduct ourselves in such a way as to maintain it being good.

We could talk a long time about what it means to take care of the world but instead ponder one thought from the gentleman at the beginning. He said, "no matter where you stand on the issue the right to destroy the world is God's, not mans." Consider, if you will these verses, *"Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will not pass away,"* from Luke 21:33, *"Then I saw a new heaven and a new earth; for the first heaven and the first earth passed away,"* from Revelation 21:1, and *"the day of the Lord will come like a thief…and the earth and its works will be burned up,"* 2 Peter 3:10.

In reading scripture, one idea should be clear. God's eternal plan is being played out no matter what mankind does. With that in mind, I leave you with this admonition from Colossians 3:17, *"And whatever you do, whether in word or deed* (at work or play, for man or nature) *do it all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the father through him."*
