Sermon: Life of Christ – The Cost of Discipleship

Intro: There is a scene that gets played out regularly on playgrounds and it goes something like this. Little toddler thinks it is fun to climb on the playground, said toddler loses footing but holds on for dear life yelling for help. The child's parent comes over to hold the child up but the child is still clutching the structure. The choice to let go is difficult for children because it seems backwards...the child must let go to find safety. Jesus taught that following him was similarly backwards.

1) Luke 9:23-26

- a) "Whoever wants to be my disciple must...take up their cross...and follow me."
 i) The cross was an instrument of death. This analogy from Jesus taught his followers to surrender the lives to God.
- b) "Whoever loses their life for me will save it."
 - i) When followers surrendered their lives to God, then true life was heirs.

2) Luke 14:25-33

a) "If anyone...does not hate their family-yes, even their own life-such a person cannot be my disciple."

b) "Count the cost"

i) A builder plans how much it will cost to complete a building.ii) A king discerns whether his army can defeat another.

Conclusion: God's kingdom is backwards. Followers must give to receive; let go to find salvation. Jesus' teaching about prayer, God's provision, wealth, and possessions should produce a giving mentality. Doing so creates a freedom that allows for followers to be radically different from the world.

(Matthew 20:1-16) Rewards for Kingdom Work

There is a joy and fulfillment in life that is much deeper than the compensation we receive for the things we do. It lies within us – knowing we have done the best we can, and that we have made a difference through the work we completed. As a young boy, I made it my aim to learn what my farm bosses wanted so I could work the fields without being told how to do it. You might say I became the householder in Jesus' parable, and I was rewarding myself by the quality of work I was doing. During my professional career, I personalized every job I had, making it my own, and was filled with a greater measure of satisfaction for my accomplishments. It is a good feeling knowing your bosses are pleased with the work you are doing.

That is the message Jesus teaches us in the things he did in his earthly body. He says, "Truly, truly, I say to you, the Son can do nothing of his own accord, but only what he sees the Father doing; for whatever he does, that the Son does likewise" (Jn. 5:19). He personalized the work the Father gave him to do, making it his very own. As disciples of Christ, that is what he calls us to do likewise. To do what we see our Lord and Master do – to learn from him – to make a difference in the lives God has entrusted to our loving and compassionate care. You see, the **rewards of kingdom work** is to be pleasing to the Father and helping others see his Son so they can receive eternal life. We are then rewarded with a deep joy and fulfillment by the things we do and how we touch the lives of God's precious people. Just as Jesus reflected the Father's presence in the things he did, so do we reflect Jesus' presence as we faithfully accomplish the Lord's work.
