Virtual Worship

At the beginning of the book of Acts, Jesus meets with the disciples one last time before ascending to heaven in the clouds. During this meeting, Jesus tells the disciples they will be his witnesses to the ends of the world. He then ascends into the heavens.

After a few days, the Spirit of God came upon the disciples during a time called Pentecost and they miraculously begin speaking to people from other nations in their own languages. On that day scripture says over 3,000 were baptized! The rest of Acts 2 tells about what these early Christians did, and it sounds like the moment at the end of fairy tales, "and they lived happily ever after," but that is not how it goes.

First, Peter and John get put on trial before the religious leaders, then a couple Christians are struck down when the lie about their money. Next, believers quarrel about how food is being distributed to widows in need, and finally Stephen is stoned in Acts 7 and becomes the first Christian martyr.

It is sad that these first 4 recorded instances of conflict are all between believers. Unfortunately, it is still the case in our time. The majority of church conflict is just that, CHURCH conflict...or conflict between believers.

On one hand it is easy to see how this is possible when the church is for all people: young/old, affluent/not, all nations, languages, colors, guys/gals. People generally find it more difficult to get along with people who are very different from themselves. That being said, selflessness was an important characteristic of Jesus and should be in us also.

Sermon Scripture: Acts 2

Sermon Thought: Today's sermon looked at the two months right after Jesus' resurrection. During this time, a day called, "Pentecost," was the launch of what we now call the, "church," when the disciples miraculously preached to people in many different languages. God's church, or as we sometimes call it the body of Christ, is open to all people.

Sermon Questions:

- 1. Describe a time when you worshipped with people in a very different format from what you are used to.
- 2. In what ways has worshipping in different ways encouraged you?
- 3. Why does the church struggle to include faithful believers who are different?
- 4. How can churches better reflect the openness to all people of God's kingdom?

Community
