I find quite odd the memories that get stuck in my mind sometimes. One such memory is of an old Popeye cartoon in which Popeye the Sailor Man sings a song with the lyrics, "I yam what I yam." After looking it up, I found it came from the second short film of Popeye which was produced in the 1930s and is a play on the words, "I am what I am."

The phrase, "I am what I am," carries with it two underlying messages, a message of acknowledgement and a message of defiance. The acknowledgement is that the person saying it admits, at least on some level, to certain flaws he or she may have. It is sort of an, "I know I'm not perfect, but I don't claim to be." The second, and more troublesome message, is that the person is unwilling to change. When combined, the idea being communicated is, "Sure, I have some issues, but I'm fine just how I am."

Let's consider those two messages for a moment. To acknowledge one's mistake or flaws is healthy. Confession is so important. James 5:16 says, "confess your sins to each other and pray for each other so that you may be healed." It is very freeing to admit the truth and doing so often reveals that we aren't the only ones battling with our struggles.

The defiant message I find very troubling. The purpose of knowing and admitting my flaws is to change and improve. One of Jesus' greatest attributes is to meet people where they are (that is acknowledgement) but then expect them to change. Consider John 8:1-11. In this account, the religious leaders, looking for ways to discredit Jesus, bring a woman who had been caught in adultery before Jesus. The law said to stone her, but Jesus preached forgiveness. To pick one would go against the other. Jesus turns the pressure back on the accusers by saying, "Let any of you who is without sin be the first to throw a stone...." Eventually the mob leaves and Jesus tells the woman something incredibly honest, loving, accepting and simple, "Go now and leave your life of sin." The message that God's followers should share is, "Yes, I have issues, but I'm working on them."
